WBHS VARSITY FOOTBALL TEAM CROWNED STATE CHAMPS

n a season filled with unprecedented challenges, the West Bloomfield High School varsity football team capped off their 2020 season with a convincing 41-0 victory over Davison High School in the MHSAA Division 1 Football Finals at Ford Field on January 16. This marked the school's first MHSAA championship in football and the first team state championship for the school in over 30 years.

Coach Ron Bellamy led his Lakers into the championship game after another successful regular season and playoff run. Making the playoffs all the more challenging was a 42-day pause in the middle of the state playoffs, leaving the completion of the season in doubt.

Team activities and the playoffs resumed in the new year, with the Lakers advancing to face the Davison Cardinals in a matchup of the two top-ranked teams in the state in Division 1.

"This season tells a true tale of how a team can work together to achieve through adversity," said Eric Pierce, WBSD athletic director. "We are so unbelievably proud of the accomplishments of this team and how they have persevered through all the obstacles that were thrown their way. In true Laker Nation fashion, they grinded, prepared, worked relentlessly and played selflessly to achieve the goals for their team and their community."

fter a season for the ages, WBHS senior Donovan Edwards was named Mr. Football for the state of Michigan by STATE CHAMPS! Sports Network.

Donovan capped his high school career with an exceptional performance in the Division 1 MHSAA State Football Finals against the defending state champions, Davison High School. He dominated, rushing for 257 yards and three scores.

REFLECTIONS ON CLOUD LEARNING:

What we've learned, what doesn't work, what works and how we can move forward

ver the past year across the state and nation, educators have been grappling with teaching and learning within the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. As we've been on this challenging journey, the one constant has been the need to adjust teaching and learning strategies and practices

to best meet student needs in terms of academics, social emotional learning and health and safety.

A key group in the West Bloomfield School District doing this work has been our District Learning Design Team, which is comprised of teachers, principals, curriculum specialists, central office administrators and school board members. They are the thought leaders in



implementing our Portrait of a Graduate, or the 4 Cs: Critical Thinker, Collaborator, Communicator and Contributor.

When we were faced with the shutdown of schools last March, the District Learning Design Team responded by creating our Cloud Learning initiative, which we've employed in both our remote learning and hybrid learning models of teaching and learning.

After nearly a year of using Cloud Learning, the District Learning Design Team recently participated in a reflection activity, where we assessed what we've learned, what's not working so well, what's working very well and what we'd like to keep doing even after we return to a new, better normal, in-person model of education. I've also come to the realization that for deeper learning to occur for students there must be an alignment, or symmetry, between what we expect of and provide for our students and how we approach adult learning, teaching practices and leadership strategies. For example, if we expect students to achieve our Portrait of a Graduate profile and become effective critical thinkers, collaborators, communicators and contributors, then we, the adults in the system, need to use and model those same characteristics as we design and implement our teaching and learning model.

To that end, the District Learning Design Team participated in a collaborative, critical thinking activity, where we reflected on Cloud Learning and how we can use the best aspects of it to improve experiences and results for students. Some of the results of that activity are highlighted below:

Cloud Learning: What We've Learned

- The importance of and how to be flexible
- How to collaborate and problem solve effectively
- Solving challenges create growth
- The person doing the most work is the person who is learning the most
- No one strategy works for all learners

Cloud Learning: What We'd Prefer Not to Continue

- Traditional testing practices (multiple choice) for student assessment
- Student projects with only one choice of design or presentation
- Parents not in our schools we're looking forward to



- welcoming parents in our buildings again they are a big support in the classroom with the younger students
- Content-only driven instruction
- Having to double dip creating content for live instruction is a ton of work

Cloud Learning: What We'd Like to Keep – with a Few Tweaks

- Time for teacher collaboration and specialized student support (Wednesdays as asynchronous days for both teacher collaboration and for giving students extra help)
- Smaller class sizes were a game changer in being able to make connections with students and to individualize/ personalize instruction
- Having subscriptions for various apps (Pear Deck, Nearpod, Canvas, etc.) so that we can allow students more flexibility in engaging with and turning in content
- Time flexibility for students
- Virtual (Zoom) conferences and open houses

Cloud Learning: Instructional Practices that We Can't Live Without


- Flexibility and personalization aspects of teaching and learning: time, space/place, methods. More flexibility period, including flexible scheduling for students
- Access to additional tech tools to help facilitate learning and collaboration between and among students and teachers
- Encouraging students to take more ownership of their

- learning becoming more independent learners not always relying on the teacher for the answers or to point them in a certain direction
- Smaller class sizes, allowing for stronger connections between students, families and teachers, resulting in more personal communication – especially phone calls or Zoom meetings to create more connection
- Being able to work with people across the district more frequently

What one sees in the above reflection activity is a desire to enhance teaching and learning quality by being more flexible, personalized, student-centered and collaborative in our approaches to and relationships between and among students, families and educators. Consequently, as we plan and continue to reimagine teaching and learning in a post-pandemic world, the importance of living our 4 Cs — Critical Thinking, Collaborating, Communicating and Contributing — becomes particularly evident.

As a school system, we commit to reflecting more on the powerful impact of symmetry between how students and adults achieve a deeper understanding of what and how they are learning. This symmetry can be used strategically to enhance learning, culture and structures, thus strengthening our support of teachers and students, who are the frontline participants in our collective efforts to realize optimal learning for all.

Bloomfield High School. She served as a teacher until 2016, when she was appointed as


Assistant Principal at West Bloomfield School.

DISTRICT PLANNING MAY 4 MILLAGE ELECTION



he West Bloomfield School District Board of Education has unanimously approved placing a 2.0 mill operating millage restoration proposal on the May 4 ballot.

While the proposal will not affect primary residences, all registered voters can vote on the proposal. Generally speaking, the proposal will only affect the tax rate on businesses, rental properties, vacant land, and second homes.

The ballot proposal seeks restoration of the non-homestead tax rate that was approved by voters in 2014. WBSD Superintendent Dr. Gerald Hill said that since the school district's non-homestead millage was approved by voters in 2014, it has been rolled back because of reductions required by the 1978 Headlee Amendment to the Michigan Constitution.

"Rollbacks mean a reduction in revenue earmarked for student instruction," Dr. Hill said. "These rollbacks have shorted the school district's operating budget by more than \$1.3 million over the last six years."

Board of Education President Stacy Brickman explained that restoration of the non-homestead millage is the school district's obligation.

"Michigan law provides that schools are funded by a sixmill levy on primary residences and by an 18-mill non-



homestead levy on businesses, rental properties, vacant land, and second homes," she added.

"By restoring the nonhomestead millage to its statutory limit of 18 mills, we are doing what state law requires us to do to fully finance our schools," Brickman said. "For the school district to receive state aid to which it is entitled, the school district has to levy 18 mills on non-homestead property."

The ballot proposal calls for a 2.0-mill increase in the operating millage rate. This will raise the current non-homestead tax rate from its current rolled-back rate of 16.9544 to 18.9544 mills. While the school district can only levy 18 mills on non-homestead property, the millage above 18 mills will protect the school district from future rollbacks that may occur.

Dr. Hill said that the ballot proposal will affect the educational program of every West Bloomfield student.

"In short, we can continue moving the West Bloomfield School District forward with no change in the current tax rate for primary homeowners," he said.

Brickman believes that voter approval of the non-homestead restoration will be a win-win for West Bloomfield's students and the West Bloomfield community.

"I also believe a successful election will have a favorable effect on the positive reputation of the West Bloomfield community," Brickman said.

Dr. Hill concluded, "We want to make sure members of our community understand that all registered voters can vote on the proposal even though the May 4 ballot proposal applies to non-homestead properties, primarily businesses and second homes. We invite any questions members of the community may have before the vote, which begins with absentee voting on March 20."

teaching, and consulting work focuses on negotiation, deal-making, conflict resolution and diplomacy. He has authored three award-winning books,

including Negotiation Genius and Negotiating

the Impossible, and has just published his first novel – The Peacemaker's Code.

Deepak is an advisor to CEOs across the globe, and to governments that are trying to negotiate an end to intractable armed conflicts. In 2020, Deepak launched a new course at Harvard entitled War & Peace: The Lessons of History for Strategy, Leadership, Negotiation, Policy and Humanity.

Also in 2020, Deepak was named Business School Professor

of the Year by Poets & Quants. He lives in Brookline, MA, with his wife (Shikha) and three children.

Deepak holds a B.A. degree in economics from the University of Michigan with High Honors and Highest

Distinction and also earned his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) from Northwestern University - Kellogg School of Management. He has also served as Visiting Faculty to the Blavatnik School of Government, University of Oxford.

When reflecting on his time at West Bloomfield High School, Deepak said many of his happiest memories are tied to the school's theater department.




