STRATEGIC PLANNING

FOR A FUTURE OF STUDENT WELL-BEING AND SUCCESS

ften one hears about organizations embarking on strategic planning to define what their hopes and dreams are for future success. In the case of the West Bloomfield School District, we are

commencing that journey this fall and will complete the strategic planning process by January 2022. Why are we doing so at this time and what can students, staff and community members expect from this future visioning exercise?

Coming off of 18 months of coping and responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, we

definitely see the need to refocus on student health, well-being and academic learning. We know that we'll not be returning to normal, but rather, we will be defining a new path forward that

requires us to redesign how we approach teaching, learning and social/ emotional growth strategies. We'll use what we've learned over the last two years and apply those learnings, along

> with feedback from our many stakeholders, to create dynamic, studentfocused strategies that will produce the best chances of success for all our students.

Beginning this August, the West Bloomfield leadership team, including the Board of Education, central office administration and school leaders, will be working to craft a

dynamic, student-centered vision for the future. The process will be facilitated by consultants from the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB). MASB has facilitated strategic planning processes and goal-setting processes with over 100 Michigan school districts. Their facilitators have extensive experience in strategic planning as well as backgrounds in education and board service. These dual competencies uniquely position MASB to customize a strategic planning process that "fits" our school district.

We will be addressing three key questions:

- Where is the district now?
- Where is the district going?

How will the district get there? Under MASB's guidance, we'll be utilizing a data-based strategic planning process that establishes priorities, focuses energy and resources, strengthens operations and ensures all stakeholders are working toward the achievement of common goals for the district.

MASB's Data-based Strategic Planning Process proposal includes:



- A pre-planning session with the superintendent and Board of Education
- A facilitated conversation with the Board of Education and district administrators to gain input
- Up to six focus group input sessions with stakeholders, i.e., staff, parents, community members, etc.
- A summary and analysis of stakeholder input (qualitative/ perceptual data)
- Educational data report (quantitative data) including fiveyear district trend data comparing the district with five reference districts and state averages
- Planning and facilitation of strategic planning retreat for approximately 40 planning team members
- Planning and facilitation of implementation workshop with key staff
- Written documentation summary of the planning process
- A summary of the strategic plan
- Recommendations for development of a board monitoring calendar

As you can see from the above summary, there will be opportunities to gain stakeholder feedback that will inform the final plan. That feedback will focus on the following elements:

Strengths of the district

- Opportunities for improvement
- Barriers to implementation
- Vision for the district

I encourage you to participate in this process by responding to surveys and participating in focus groups. Also, if you have a particular interest to become more involved, let me know if you

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ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT



DANA NESSEL WBHS Class of 1987

ana Nessel is a 1987 graduate of West Bloomfield High School and currently serves as attorney general for the State of Michigan. Attorney General Nessel took some time to update our community on her journey since leaving WBHS and she shared some advice for current students.

What have you been up to since graduating from West Bloomfield High School?

Since my time at West Bloomfield High School, I attended and graduated

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from the University of Michigan and Wayne State University Law School. I went to work first in the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office as a criminal prosecutor and later struck out on my own in private practice.

I had the opportunity, the honor, and the privilege to represent the DeBoers in a groundbreaking case that was ultimately heard by the United States Supreme Court. That decision allowed marriage equality across the nation, and I am deeply proud of the work so many of us did on the case. It is the combination of that work - as a prosecutor and a

defense attorney – which ultimately inspired me to seek the Michigan Democratic Party's nomination as their candidate for attorney general.

I was sworn in on the steps of the capitol as Michigan's 54th attorney general on January 1, 2019, and immediately took steps to restore the department's commitment to serving as the people's attorney.

As attorney general, I've sought out protections for Michigan consumers, workers and our state's most important natural resource – its Great Lakes. My office has also launched Michigan's Elder Abuse Task Force and formed the Hate Crimes Unit. I am incredibly proud of the work done by the attorneys, investigators, and personnel of the Department of Attorney General. It is exhilarating to be able to help so many people in our state.

On a more personal note, I live in southeast Michigan with my wife, Alanna Maguire, and twin sons, Alex and Zach.

How did West Bloomfield High School influence your current path?

Our educational experiences help shape the individuals we become and that is especially true of our high school experiences. For me, West Bloomfield High School is the place where I experienced intellectual, emotional, and social challenges – just as we all do in high school. The education I received at WBHS helped prepare me for life as a college student at the University of Michigan. The social network I developed as a student was a source of support for me in the rest of my life, and still is to this day.

I believe our impact on the world is directly related to the experiences that impacted our lives. Certainly, my high school experience contributes to the actions I have taken as an adult and the place I find myself in today.

What advice do you have for our current students?

Be true to yourself – even if you are not sure exactly who you are yet. Neither my personal life nor my professional life followed a traditional path, but that does not mean they are any less fulfilling. I made choices over the years based on what I wanted for myself, my career, and my life without seeking approval from others. JEREMY SHERMAN WBHS Class of 2010

eremy Sherman is a 2010 graduate of West Bloomfield High School and currently works as the Director of Marketing & Growth at SNACKLINS. Jeremy took some time to update our community on his journey since leaving WBHS and he shared some advice for current students.

What have you been up to since graduating from West Bloomfield High School?

After graduating from West Bloomfield High School in 2010, I took a gap year to serve as BBYO's international president. BBYO is a Jewish youth organization with thousands of members across the globe. Each year, an international president is elected by peers and takes a year off before college to travel and visit BBYO chapters around the country and world. In my role with BBYO, I had the honor of being invited to the White House and had a chance to meet with President Obama.

After my gap year, I went to Washington University in St. Louis, where I majored in business economics and political science. I was very involved on campus and served as senior class president during my final year. In that role, I had the privilege of giving the student commencement speech at my graduation.

I'd always had my eyes set on moving to Washington D.C., so after graduation I started a job at Deloitte in their federal consulting practice. Over the course of two years, I worked on numerous projects for different government agencies, including USPS, Department of Defense, Department of Commerce, and Department of Energy. I then

moved to a position within Deloitte to a group called the Greenhouse. It operates much like a start-up that facilitates custom workshops for all types of clients across many different topics.

I loved the start-up atmosphere so much that I decided to make a major change in my career and leave Deloitte to join a tiny company named SNACKLINS. SNACKLINS is a rapidly growing snack brand based in Rockville, MD.

And that leads me to today, where I live



with my boyfriend, Michael, and my dog, Oreo, in Washington D.C.

How did West Bloomfield High School influence your current path?

I think West Bloomfield High School did a great job of exposing me to tons of different subjects and activities, so that by the time I got to college I had a wellrounded understanding of different areas

of study. Even though I chose to study business and political science in college, I still use things I learned in psychology and Spanish classes at WBHS in my work today. Also, WBHS is a very diverse school with students from all different backgrounds, especially during my time as a student. I think I took that diversity for granted, because as I've grown older and moved away from West Bloomfield, I've learned that most people didn't have the same experience growing up. That exposure has helped me be a better teammate and member of society.

What advice do you have for our current students?

My advice to current students is don't be afraid to make drastic changes in your future career. Oftentimes, the longer you do something the harder it may seem to make a change. But the modern-day career requires constantly learning new skills and reinventing yourself. Don't be afraid to change and try new things in order to find something you're truly passionate about.

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WBSD SUMMER CONSTRUCTION RECAP



onstruction crews had a busy summer in the West Bloomfield School District making improvements across the districts. Despite the wetter-than-usual summer months, the crews worked hard to ensure our buildings would be ready for the start of the 2021-22 school year.

Doherty Elementary Roof Replacement – Delayed until 2022

Due to supply chain issues related to acquiring roofing materials, the Doherty Elementary Roof Replacement project has been delayed until 2022. The roof is still in good working order, making this change in the schedule possible.

Scotch Elementary Roof Replacements

The district continued to follow its roofing replacement cycle with work on 6,875 square feet of roof being replaced at Scotch Elementary. This relatively small project will be completed by mid-August, prior to the start of the 2021-22 school year.

Sheiko Elementary Parking Lot Improvements

The Sheiko Elementary parking lot received some much-needed attention this summer through a complete reconfiguration. This process allows separate school bus traffic from parent traffic for improved safety as well as an additional 41 parking spaces plus two additional handicap spaces to the lot for ADA compliance. Weather has been a factor in the progress of this job but the project will be completed by mid-to-late August.

West Bloomfield High School Entrance Door Replacement

Main entry doors at West Bloomfield High School were replaced through the district's Building and Site Sinking Fund. These new doors add an extra layer of security and efficiency to West Bloomfield High School

West Bloomfield Middle School Construction

The building has truly begun to take shape and with the demolition of Orchard Lake Middle School, the progress is now visible from Orchard Lake Road for everyone in the community to enjoy. Despite the rainy summer, the project is still on schedule and we look forward to a grand opening ceremony next summer.

From the exterior, the school's trademark "wave" over the iCenter has taken shape, followed by extensive stone and masonry work around the building. Parking lots, entryway and athletic areas are taking shape as well. Crews are in the final stages of enclosing the building. Once that is completed, roofing and the remaining brickwork can take place on the outside of the building.

The work inside the building is just as impressive, with the building's signature learning communities, common areas, arts and performing spaces and athletics facilities all coming together in a remarkable fashion. The building's mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems are installed with painting and concrete polishing taking place as areas begin to finalize.





ISCOVER THE WONDERS OF PRESCHOOL

here is ALWAYS something new to DISCOVER in preschool! As children grow, they develop in various

phases at their age, which lead to increased curiosity and discovery within and about themselves. As we say in Early Childhood, a child's job is to play and discover. As they grow, a child will mature and learn the responsibilities of life, but they will never truly be able to experience curiosity and exploration as they did as a young child.

A child is motivated by what s/he wants to know and how something will work. Creative minds are at work and pretend play is valued by the expression of their interest and everyday life. With this understanding, the West Bloomfield Preschool Academy understands that a child's job is to learn by exploring and discovering through play. We use the HighScope Curriculum, which is research based and allows the child to guide their learning by their interest and discovery.

Michigan's Early Childhood Standards of Education, enables children to explore all domains of learning from Approaches

to Learning, Social-Emotional, Physical, Mathematics, Language Arts, Creative Representation, Social Studies, and Science. Working with the child on a consistent basis and observing his or her development and interest enables teachers to scaffold lessons and small groups to individual children. Our belief is that we need to teach the child, see where s/he is and expand on their knowledge of where they need to be in their next learning phase.
