### DISTRICT STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

District's strategic plan is an opportunity for the Board of Education, administration, staff, parents, families, students, and



community to come together to express their goals for the future of our District. The strategic planning process evaluates

and changes the school district's direction in response to an everchanging environment.

Through a systematic approach, strategic planning produces essential decisions and actions that form and guide District initiatives intended to serve our stakeholders. It is our opportunity to collectively create a roadmap that will guide our continuous improvement for the next five years.

In February 2021, Superintendent Hill and the Board of Education made a commitment to create a three-to five-year strategic plan. The School Board formed a partnership with the Michigan Association of School Boards to serve as facilitators for this project. The District, under the leadership of the School Board president and superintendent, completed a process that was data driven, inclusive of District stakeholders and focused on the priorities that will help the District succeed.

Eight community, parent/guardian, and staff forums and an electronic survey resulted in 805 people providing input for the planning process. A Strategic Planning Team of 63 community members, parents/ quardians, staff, and students participated in an all-day planning retreat on April 9, 2022. The 29-member implementation team met to (a) review the demographic, achievement, and perception data; (b) formulate district goals; and (c) identify areas of strength and improvement. By the end of the retreat, the team had formulated goals and priority objectives for:

- Academics/Programs
- Learning Environment and Culture
- Personnel and Leadership
- Communication and Community Involvement
- Operations and Finance
   Throughout the planning process

The system and practices set forth in this plan allow for continuous improvement of our students academically, socially, and emotionally.

This strategic plan is a living document. It will serve as the guiding map for future planning, resource allocation, staff development, and decision-making over the next five years. We look forward to providing the community quarterly updates with regards to our progress.


# A NEW HOME FOR ROOSEVELT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

# JACOB PODELL WBHS Class of 2013

acob Podell is currently working in Chicago as a staff law clerk for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. His role there is to advise federal judges on how to resolve federal appeals from Illinois, Indiana, and Wisconsin – with an emphasis on criminal and prisoner-rights cases.

Jacob received his J.D. from the University of Michigan Law School (2021). While in law school, he wrote voraciously, serving as an editor of the Michigan Law Review, where he published an academic piece on the availability of lawsuits for private parties to recoup the costs of cleaning hazardous waste sites. He also participated in the Moot Court Competition and won the Best Brief Award, interned for the Environmental Law Institute in Washington, D.C., and interned with the U.S. Attorney's Office for

the District of Alaska.

Prior to his legal studies, Jacob received his B.A. in Environmental Studies from the University of Michigan (2017). There, he was a competitor on the Mock Trial Team (captaining the team to Nationals), was appointed as the Chief Justice of the University of Michigan Student Body Government, volunteered for the University's LGBTQ+ Center, and served as the #1 grilled cheese fan in all of Ann Arbor.

When he's not in the courtroom, Jacob is an avid outdoor enthusiast. He took a post-bar-exam road trip from Chicago to Anchorage, Alaska – visiting, among others, the Badlands, Yellowstone, Banff, and Jasper national parks.

## How has WBHS helped you on your current path?

By far, the most notable opportunity I took advantage of at WBHS was applying for the **United States** Senate Youth Program, with the help of my teacher. This program accepts only two high schoolers from each state and involves travel to Washington, D.C. to get a

behind-the-scenes look at public service. Through this program, I personally met public servants at the highest level of the federal government, including Justice Elena Kagan, Secretary of State John Kerry, and President Barack Obama.

This amazing experience served as both inspiration to and guidance on how to become a public servant.

### What advice do you have for our current students?

Write persuasively. It may seem like such an evergreen statement from a lawyer but this essential skill is just that. Any career you go into will have at least some component that requires you to research and then organize that evidence clearly – all with the goal of convincing someone of your point. Seek out opportunities to write, and, as importantly, seek out feedback on your writing. Solid writing skills are a good way to stand out early on in your post-high-school education

or career.

Also, take a break. I took a gap year between undergrad and law school and a few months off between the bar exam and my first legal job. School can be tiring and the time off between

between transitions can help you come back feeling refreshed and ready to tackle the new challenges that await you.

# HELPING PRESCHOOLERS THRIVE IN SCHOOL

**RESCHOOL** can be the first time a child is away from home; the first time children are cared for by someone other than family; and the first time children are engaged, playing with a large group of their peers. Preschool is a tremendous year of firsts, with the first major milestone of education. There can be many feelings going on with both the parents and the children.

# How can we help ensure both are ready for this exciting time?

- Talk to your child about what to expect, bring your child to see the classroom, and meet the teacher before the first day of school.
  - a. Explore the room and areas where your child will be learning.
- Read about experiences your child will have in preschool. The following books are wonderful resources:

b. Our Class is a Family by Shannon Olsen c. The Night Before Preschool by Natasha Wing d. Lola Goes to School by Anna McQuinn 3. Make it exciting! Let your child pick out their backpack, lunchbox, and something comforting for them to have at rest time. Give them choices of

what they want to bring.

4. Children this age sense how their parents are feeling – they are perceptive. Do your best to be positive when speaking with your child about this new experience. Share your worries about this new milestone with other adults

- when your child is not around.
- 5. When dropping off your child, give your child a big hug and say goodbye. Even if they are crying and stuck to your leg, give them a big hug and say goodbye one time. Please know that our teachers are prepared for this and they will comfort your child. Our teachers will let you know how they are doing and they will make sure your child is feeling safe, nurtured, and loved. We understand how difficult this is, however, it is extremely important.
- Building relationships is imperative. Talk with your child's teacher about how things are going and what you would like to see your child accomplish this year.

Our goal is for our children to leave preschool with a love for school and a strong social and academic foundation for learning. We cannot wait to see their smiling faces again!

Oakland Community College's resources and supportive professors helped sisters from Mexico achieve their goals, springboard to the next level

HEN Valeria Lezama arrived in Michigan with her family in April 2019 after her dad's automotive job was relocated, she had just graduated from high school in Puebla, Mexico. As she looked at her college options in the U.S., she had no idea if she was capable of quickly transitioning to a completely different

higher education system in the fall. She felt stressed and completely lost.

Valeria teamed up with her sister Jennifer, an incoming high school senior, to quickly research universities and learned about an opportunity they said isn't offered in Mexico – community college.

The concept of earning an associate degree in two years and then transferring to a university sounded intriguing to the sisters, who are now both Oakland Community College alumni.

"The OCC counselors explained everything to me, from the moment I wanted to apply to the college through graduation," Valeria said. "I always had that support from professors, counselors and staff. The professors are really good. I decided I wanted to go into finance because of them."

In the fall, Valeria and Jennifer's twin sisters, Rocio and Gabriela, will follow their lead and begin their post-secondary

education at OCC. The twins graduated in May from West Bloomfield High School.

"I'm excited," Rocio said. "I'm sure I will have very good instructors and the opportunity to get involved in

activities. Jennifer was in the student recruiter program and I think I will do the same. English is not my first language, and this would give me the opportunity to practice speaking in front of more people."

Valeria received an associate in business administration from OCC in 2021 and now attends Oakland University.

Jennifer graduated in May with two degrees – an Associate of Applied Science and an Associate of Arts. In the fall, Jennifer will transfer to the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and major in mechanical engineering.

"What I like the most about OCC is all the resources and support the faculty and OCC community give you," Jennifer said. "I have found a lot of support and motivation from faculty at OCC because class sizes are small, we have a very good connection with instructors, and they can get to know you better. I think that is something I could not get at another institution."

After seeing her sisters' success, Gabriela said OCC became her college of choice for the fall.

"You can transfer to a university and save money," she said. "It also gives you time to decide which area of study you want to pursue."

Jennifer said OCC made the transition to a new and different

educational system easier.


"If your goal is to get a higher education degree, you can do that with just a different path and in the end, you will get more from that by going to OCC," she said.


