THROUGH COLLABORATIVE RELATIONSHIPS AND INNOVATIVE PROBLEM SOLVING


S, I conclude 10 years as superintendent of the West Bloomfield School District, I'm reflecting back on my initial comments upon taking this leadership position. My wife, Cindy, and I were excited to join a community that values education and takes pride in offering great opportunities to young people. What was true then remains so today, and we are proud to live and work in a community focused on what's best for the students we collectively serve. The people we've come to know and the relationships we've established will be forever valued.

When I was appointed, I shared my values and beliefs about what it takes to be an effective educational leader. First and foremost. I believe in the infinite worth and dignity of all people. Consequently, I have a strong conviction that we should treat all people, including children and youth, with respect and carry ourselves with integrity as we work through the numerous demands inherent in our work with young people. Second, because education is a people-intensive profession, it is imperative that our relationships be characterized by mutual respect, openness, honesty, and a sincere appreciation for each other's thoughts, ideas, and contributions so that we maximize student success. I value the culture of inclusive decision-making and creative problem solving that we've established over the years in the West Bloomfield School District.

Given these underlying beliefs and values, my focus over the past decade, when faced with challenging situations and important decisions, has been to be clear about those challenges, define the issues, identify common interests, tap into our collective experiences and wisdom, develop innovative solutions, and take decisive action. Toward that end, we've been successful in a number of areas:

• Financially, our fund balance has grown from less than 3 percent to 18 percent

 Constructing the new West Bloomfield Middle School, a state-of-the-art educational facility made possible by the passage of a \$120 million bond approved by voters on a 70-percent Yes vote in 2017



- Renovated and/or refurnished all of our schools with proceeds from that same bond issue
- Implemented Interest-Based Bargaining (IBB) practices that have resulted in mutually beneficial union contracts with teachers and support staff
- Involved teachers, support staff, and administrators in key areas of decision-making including Curriculum Council, District Design Team, Strategic Planning, etc.
- Implemented 1 to 1 technology District-wide
- Created a forward-thinking and innovative Teaching and Learning Services team, focused on curriculum development, instructional coaching, and professional development
- Developed a Board-approved anti-racism resolution
- Developed our Portrait of a Graduate, based upon the 4 Cs of Collaborator, Critical Thinker & Creative Problem Solver, Communicator, and Contributor.

All of these accomplishments and several others were the result of the greater WBSD community of stakeholders coming together to create brighter futures for our students. Our common interest has been to create dynamic and supportive learning environments for each of our learners so they can be their best IN and FOR the world.

It is my hope that the West Bloomfield School District continues to be known as an innovative, inclusive, childcentered, and welcoming place where all students and families feel that they belong.

WBMS CONSTRUCTION NEARING COMPLETION

AJOR strides have been made on the interior spaces at West Bloomfield Middle School as construction crews continue to work tirelessly to bring the project to completion in time for the fall 2022/2023 school year.

The gym floor has been decaled and the final coats of urethane have been applied. Carpeting has been laid in all of the classrooms. The permanent cabinetry

and signage throughout the school has been installed. The entire interior of the building has been painted and crews will continue completing touch ups in the final stages.

The lockers for the hallways and locker rooms have been delivered and will be installed in May.

The concrete floors throughout the school will continue to be polished until they are complete. Currently, Smart and dry erase boards are being installed in all of the classrooms.



The fire alarms are being tested and moldings are being installed. The outdoor courtyards are ready for turf to be installed. With the weather starting to turn in our favor, the final stages of the site work will begin in the coming days to include asphalt, concrete, and landscaping.

DANNY KORNFELD WBHS Class of 2010

anny Kornfeld is a New York Citybased actor working in theater and film. He has appeared across the nation at renowned regional theatres and has developed many new musicals and plays in various readings, workshops, and developmental labs. He is a graduate of Syracuse University, where he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in drama.

Danny had the opportunity to return home to Detroit when he played Mark Cohen in the 20th Anniversary Tour of RENT at the Fisher Theatre. He was also last seen in New York in The Transport Group's awardwinning musical Renascence by Dick Scanlan (Thoroughly Modern Millie) and Carmel Dean. You can find the cast recording wherever you stream music.

Danny is currently starring in Barry Manilow's long-awaited musical HARMONY in New York City, directed by Tony Award winner Warren Carlyle. Harmony is based on a true story about the Comedian Harmonists, six entertaining young men who came together in the 1920s and became a sensation, and were later silenced during Nazi-era Germany.

How did WBHS help Danny on his current path?

"The foundation and sense of community that WBHS provided has served me as both an artist and a human being," Kornfeld said. "While in high school, I was able to explore and celebrate my passions in an environment that was supportive and expanding. In addition to the theater department, WBHS provided me with the opportunity to deepen my growth through student council and leadership, where I learned to engage with a truly diverse student body. This exposure was important in fueling my creative outlook while also preparing me for the diversity of a place like New York City, where collaboration and respect for different cultures and

perspectives are essential to success. It was also through the scope and responsibility given to students in producing full-scale theatrical productions at WBHS that gave me the work ethic and confidence to pursue my goals with full force."

What advice do you have for our current students?

"No matter what you do in life, the key is to be passionate about it. With passion comes tenacity, which enables you to maintain a level of commitment that will sustain you, especially during challenging times. It is important to be accepting of yourself both your strengths and your weaknesses - and to be accepting of others, even those whom you might not agree with. The world is more exciting because we all have unique perspectives. The job of an artist is to tell people's stories in an attempt to bring us together in a shared understanding of the human experience. Whether you're an artist or have chosen another path, the more you open yourself to others' stories, the more fruitful your work and relationships will be."



'IT LITERALLY TURNED MY LIFE AROUND.'

How a short-term training program from Oakland Community College gave Shawn McWilliams opportunity and a lucrative career.

IKE so many teenagers, Shawn
McWilliams graduated high
school without knowing what he
wanted to do with his life.

"I was told to go to a four-year college and get a degree to find a job," said Shawn, who graduated from Avondale High School in 2019. "But I never really had a plan for what that meant."

After attending a local college for a few semesters, Shawn felt like he wasn't finding the direction he needed. And that was when his mother showed him what would become a life-changing resource.

"She told me about Michigan's Economic Workforce Development Program and how you could train for the latest jobs at OCC," Shawn said. "When she mentioned that I could learn about robotics in just a few months and possibly have a job waiting for me, I was hooked."

Hooked indeed, and for good reason. Shawn immediately applied for a 14-week, short-term training course at Oakland Community College in robotics and PLC programming. Not only was he accepted but he qualified for free tuition based on eligibility requirements through Michigan Works!



And that was just the beginning.

"There were so many things I loved about the program right away," Shawn said. "For starters, the instructors all had real-world experience. Also, everything was completely hands on with very little book work. And I really loved how comprehensive everything was. I definitely felt prepared to get a job."

Beyond taking robots apart and putting them back together, Shawn learned about the various business opportunities available for someone in this cutting-edge field. This included programming robots in countless industries around the world such as aerospace and big pharma.

Of course, for lifelong Michigan natives like Shawn, the ability to work in the Detroit metro area – the world's epicenter of automotive automation – was just as appealing.

"It was clear to me early on that I could use my new knowledge to work in any number of automotive jobs," Shawn said. "So you can imagine how excited I was to discover that I had some high-paying prospects right around the corner that were waiting for me when I finished."

That's right. After only one 14-week course – and with no previous experience – Shawn went from classroom to employment. He now works for GLOBAL Automation Technologies, LLC in Auburn Hills as





an automation engineer, where he programs computers for automating automotive assembly line processes. And he loves it.

"This technology is so fascinating and there are so many interesting things going on," Shawn said.

And the best part? Shawn loves the fact he's making more money than he thought possible. While most of his friends are taking student loans, Shawn hopes to make a six-figure salary within a few years.

Shawn is also grateful to OCC for helping him to find a huge opportunity in a short amount of time.

"The program quite literally turned my life around," Shawn said. "If not for it, I have no idea what I would be doing today."

WBSD SUMMER LEARNING

BSD families have been invited to join us for summer learning and summer camp this year. Most of Summer Learning is paid for by WBSD and invitations have been sent to select students in an effort to accelerate their learning, provide academic interventions, and support. Summer Learning Elementary – Laker Adventure

The Laker Adventure will take students on reading quests, math challenges, and exciting tasks that explore their interests. Students will continue unfinished learning in small groups based on personalized skills and goals. Each day, students will participate in small reading and math groups to enhance their comprehension, skills, and have some fun. We will continue to invite families until we reach our program cap so that we can support as many learners as possible.

Middle School – Lakers Explore!

Students will explore innovative ways to approach both academic and personal struggles with daily math and English classes that blend social-emotional learning into each lesson. Teachers will focus on CPM (math) story problem skills, writing with strong claims and evidence, and reading comprehension strategies that boost proficiency in all subject areas. Their elective class cycles through new topics each day. We will continue to invite families until we reach our program cap so that we can support as many learners as possible.

High School – EXCEL: EXperience, Community, Education, and Lifelong Learning

Summer Learning will focus on helping students recover lost graduation credits along with addressing some of the issues that contributed to the need for summer school. We will build learners through skill development, content education, and social and emotional learning. Academic courses will focus on the fundamentals needed to master each subject area, while our EXCEL program will work with students to strengthen coping and self-management skills.



Mansour Memorial Foundation

IMPACTS WBSD

N July of 2013, John and Ann Mansour lost two of their three children, Alexander, eleven, and Gabrielle, six, in a horrible boating accident. Whether you knew the Mansours or not, this tragedy shook the lives of many West Bloomfield families.

In the months following the tragedy, the Mansour Family desperately wanted to give back to the schools that supported all three of their children, especially their surviving daughter, Adriana. They wanted to turn this horrible event into something positive to commemorate their children's lives, thus the Alexander and

Gabrielle Mansour Memorial Fund was founded.

Over the years, fundraising events have been held in their memory to support the foundation. Adult

bowling nights, silent auctions at the Gretchko Spooktacular, and the Spring Fling brought the community together to support the Mansour family during this difficult time. Alex and Gabby were gone but not forgotten by administrators, teachers, parents, and their peers.

Since 2014, the Foundation has

disk golf equipment.


